Pre-Exercise

Successful exercises require significant planning to ensure a productive and safe learning experience for participants. Like any other exercise, rescue tas for exercises should follow the Homenda Security Exercise Evoluation Program (HSEEP) process to plan, deliver, and evaluate the exercise. The steps below are intended to provide additional context to exercise planners as they implement the HSEEP planning process.

What are the objectives of the exercise?



The exercise planning team should first determine the objectives of the exercise, prior to determining what types of weapons are most appropriately Consistent with heters. The initial step in planning any exercise is to first determine the objectives of the exercise. Inscue task force exercises are no exception to this process.
